After cashing the ♠A, the defence to hold declarer to eight tricks is for West to switch to the ♣Q, surrounding declarer's jack. Mike Hughes was the only one who found that.

The defence started well enough with three rounds of clubs. After a heart to the queen and a spade up, came a heart to the ace and another heart.

It seemed to West that declarer had taken a successful heart finesse was about to ruff this one, so a club was pitched. In with a chance, declarer cut loose with a diamond.

The only defence now is for West to return a diamond and for East to overtake to give partner a ruff. Then a club at trick 11 brings East's ♠6 into play for one off.

When they didn't find that, 1♠ scored a hard-earned +80.

Some hands from the Semis. Four different approaches:

#### Semis, Bd 10

There was a 12 IMP swing in both matches on this hand. Everyone was in 4♥ on a diamond lead.

It's appealing to play three rounds of diamonds but Geeske Joel switched to her singleton club. -620.

At the other table, Sartaj Hans ruffed the diamond continuation with dummy's ♥8, overruffed.

When North's ♥J fell under dummy's ace, Hans crossed to the ♠K to lead the ♥10-7-K for one off. Just looking at the trump suit, it's better to play South for the queen but the 6-2 diamond break swings the odds. -100.

In the other match, both declarers chose to pitch a spade on the third diamond. They soon reached the same crucial position. John Hunt played trumps from the top for -100, while Les Grewcock finessed.


It's unclear but South had opened the bidding, though a stray quack here or there doesn't seem to carry much weight these days. Here's an ugly one:

### Semis, Bd 15

Game makes in four strains, so this must have felt like 6 IMPs out. However, Dalley - Nunn bid these cards to 7 v x for 9 IMPs the other way.

The first semi was close at half time. then JOHANNSSON picked up 35 IMPs with boards like this:

### Semis. Bd 29




You can probably work out what happened. Matt led the ♥A. (Ron played the ♥8, maybe count)

Mullamphy saw that any switch could be costly, so played another heart for -1430. A mere 26 IMPs.

Given his time again, Klinger would surely play the ♥K at trick one.

And this:

#### Semis, Bd 28



The Dalley double was a transfer. 4♠ looks normal and made in the other match on the ♣10 lead.

However, Axel found the ◆A lead to shoot the contract. When the ◆Q held at trick two, he switched to a trump for +200 and 9 IMPs.

JOHANSSON had overcome an 11 IMP carry-backward to win by 21 IMPs, so gained 32 IMPs at the table.

The other semi became a blowout, with ASHTON winning by 123 IMPs.
