Following my trend of trying to find deals where a defender or declarer triumphed, rather than focus on the (many) errors I see, is the deal above.

Best played hand so far goes to Sydney evergreen Tom Kiss, playing with my old friend Alasdair Beck, an ex-Kiwi, longtime resident of Sydney.

Alasdair and I started our bridge partnership in 1970, when he was still a boarder at Auckland Boys' Grammar School, and I was trying to find my niche in life (!).

In those heady days of bridge ignorance, we were lucky to be founder members of Akarana (Māori name for Auckland) Bridge Club. The club was formed as an arena for young bridge players - the aim was to provide a nurturing club for under 30s that was less formal than the stuffy Auckland Bridge Club. Akarana celebrated it's 50th anniversary in 2020, but the nucleus of the club are now seniors!

tricks were possible. Six Norths made 4♠, so I went



through the wonderful replay facility offered by RealBridge, looking at the lines of play of the declarers who succeeded.

All but Tom made the contract through a defensive error of some sort (one East didn't cover  $\blacklozenge$ Q!, so North blithely let it run). Most Wests allowed the contract to make, however, by switching to a low club early in the play, without being endplayed into having to do so.

Tom, however, noting that the club pips could pose difficulties for the defenders, embarked on a more elegant double dummy line against the experienced partnership of Victorians Bob Gallus and Stephen Weisz.


He partially eliminated the hand by ruffing dummy's third heart and two of dummy's diamonds, ruffing red cards with high trumps in hand, and overtaking a low spade in hand with dummy's ♠7 to ruff a second diamond.

Having a full count of West's shape, he now played a club from hand, inserting  $\clubsuit$ 8 and end-playing West. In with  $\clubsuit$ J, had the choice of leading away from  $\clubsuit$ K or giving a ruff and sluff.

Inserting  $\clubsuit$ 10 from the East hand would not have helped , as the same endplay develops.

Alasdair and Tom have regularly played the popular NZ Congress, in 2018 and 2019 winning the Seniors Teams, and in 2019 the Seniors Pairs.

# Call me old fashioned . . .

But I fail to see why I should be obliged to open agricultural hands vulnerable against not with subminimum honours and suboptimal shape (Board 5, above).

I am in the old-fashioned camp with Neil Ewart, (not all his decisions, however, are so passive) who passed the North hand, with the deal subsequently being passed out.

At the table I watched, Kim Morrison - Chris Hughes defended carefully to take 1NT two down. Kim led ♥K (also an old-fashioned boy, leading from his best suit), and declarer won ♥A, hoping to retain some sort of control over the heart suit. He played a diamond to the queen and ran ♠J, correctly covered by Morrison with ♠Q. He won the ace, decimating the meagre North hand even more, and continued a spade, ducked by Chris Hughes.

A third spade saw Hughes win and play  $\blacklozenge$  10, forcing out  $\blacklozenge$ A. Declarer won and played a forlorn club to the king and ace. At this point the defenders cashed out for +200, 5 IMPs to EWART.

Maybe it's because we have poor defenders that we open the North hand. At the other three tables, each partscore made. In 1NT on a club lead, Arjuna de Livera made quick work of the hand, +120.

♣A against Roger Januszke's 2♠ swung the timing in his favour at the other table.
