

Overnight leaders of the A Final, James Coutts and Liam Milne, would look to build on their narrow lead over Marshall Lewis and Maurits van der Vlugt. Everyone else would be searching for the session of miracles.

The first set began with two contending pairs duking it out. Justin Mill and Ben Thompson landed an early body blow. Justin opened his awkward collection 1NT, solving the problematic rebid that many Easts faced after 1♥ - Pass - 1♠ - Pass. Ben launched into game and the defence was under the microscope.

Nick led the diamond Jack to dummy's Ace, and Justin pulled a low heart. Knowing very little about declarer's hand, GeO rose with the Ace to switch to a club. Now, however, Justin was able to ruff down the heart King to establish a discard for one of dummy's losing clubs. +420 was worth 81% for Justin and Ben.

This was a typical auction at many tables. Some Wests interposed 3♥ and some Norths drove to the hopeless 4♠. A few declarers in 3♠ were doubled for their troubles by those Wests still believing in miracles midway through the session.

Where West led the club King, proper technique dictated that South duck the club Ace. The defence is powerless to draw declarer's trumps while establishing and cashing a second club trick. When clubs were continued without the defence touching trumps, declarer could cross to dummy's diamond Queen, ruff the third round of clubs in the short hand before playing a spade. Cashing the spade Ace and King works no better - declarer can simply finish drawing trumps and cash the diamonds. The two +730s were a shared top for North/South.

This deal offered opportunities both for fine declarer play and defence.


Liam Milne declared 3NT on the diagrammed auction, James Coutts having opened 2♦ ‘Flannery’ showing four spades and five hearts. Marlene Watts led the spade jack, taken by the ace for a diamond finesse to the ten and king.

A spade was continued, and Milne played three more diamonds establishing the suit. With nine top tricks and a tenth available via the club finesse (Watts had discarded discouraging clubs), the pressure was about to come on the defence.

When Prescott returned a club, Milne won the king in dummy, finessed the jack and ran the diamond suit. With one winner to play, the position was:




The diamond deuce forced East to discard a heart to guard the spades. When dummy’s spade was discarded, West was now squeezed between hearts and clubs. A classic double squeeze for +460 and 88%.

What could the defence have done? Given declarer’s failure to play on hearts, it was likely from each defender’s point of view that their partner had the other heart honour. A heart switch at any point would have broken up the squeeze and saved a trick.

By this point, the leaders for the majority of the event, James and Liam, were being hounded by new adversaries: their teammates, Tony Nunn and Paul Dalley, who were in the midst of a monster final session.

Well-placed with a 59% average from the first 15 boards, Nunn-Dalley turned up the heat for the last four rounds.

Paul “Neo” Dalley has been absorbing everything he can about the expert game and there is no better partner for him than Tony “Morpheus” Nunn. This event has been the culmination of a great amount of practice, patience and perseverance.

By now it was a three-horse race for the 2022 Bobby Richman Open Pairs title. Nunn-Dalley were happy to have an opportunity to show off their constructive bidding, and made short work of this cold 26-point slam.

After Dalley showed club shortage, Nunn’s hand blossomed in value. After some cue-bids, Nunn asked for key cards and bid to the untouchable 6♠.

The field struggled with this board, with only four pairs reaching slam and scoring 88% for their efforts. Edgton-Ashton, Lavings-Krochmalik, and Mill-Thompson were the other three, with the latter being against Milne-Coutts. With Milne-Coutts scoring 12%, the scoreboard showed a new leader: Nunn-Dalley.

Whilst high level competitive auctions abounded yesterday (hopefully you all had some help from Andy’s Celebrity Talk), today they were a rare beast. The following board was today’s wildest offering:

At the tables where North opened 2♠ showing spades and a minor, East's double was met with a raise to 4♠ by South. West had the difficult decision of whether to act over 4♠, and, if doing so, choosing how to act. Most acted, and the question was whether to bid 5♥ (either directly or via 4NT) or to double.

Those who doubled (or passed, and then passed partner's double) were rewarded with partner's moose providing the four requisite defensive tricks. Those who forged on to 5♥ were usually doubled by South, who also happened to be praying for partner to provide a defensive trick or two.

All prayers were met today, with both game contracts failing more often than not. Of the three pairs in contention for the title, Nunn-Dalley scored 91% defending 5♥x +300, Milne-Coutts notched up 58% for 5♥x +100, while Mill-Thompson declared 5♥ going -100 for 42%.

With two rounds to go, Nunn-Dalley had a gorgeous auction to the top matchpoint spot of 3NT. The defence had three top tricks to take, but understandably the first two tricks were a diamond to the ace and a diamond returned. Now Dalley had the rest.

Twelve tricks and +490 was worth 85% and Nunn-Dalley were now firmly in the lead, still being chased by Milne-Coutts and Mill-Thompson.

Another board, another matchpoints-possible 3NT. Should you try 3NT, and if so how would you bid it? Playing two-over-one, a sensible auction would be 1♥-2♣-2NT-3NT, North eschewing the heart fit opposite a balanced hand. With 4333 shape opposite 5332, 3NT often plays at least as well as the eight-card major fit.

Nunn-Dalley had a modern auction which never mentioned hearts, treating the poor five-card suit as unworthy of a 1♥ opening. Do you want to be in 3NT, risking going down when the defence attacks clubs? You certainly do today with clubs 6-1 and the hearts running, with eleven tricks available in both hearts and notrumps.

The only other pair to find 3NT were Watts-Prescott (after a weak notrump from South was raised to game), so Nunn-Dalley had another shared top for 96%, now running away with the event.

Several more excellent scores followed and all of a sudden, Nunn-Dalley had averaged a whopping 81% from their last four rounds. Aside from one average and one 23% score, every board was a top or close to it.

Their final session score was an enormous 68.77% to win the event by a handy 6.4% with 179.39, ahead of Mill-Thompson on 172.99, just pipping Milne-Coutts with 172.59.

It is rare to see such a large single-session score in the Bobby Richman Open Pairs final, but sometimes it is just your day to shine. Well done to the worthy winners, and we expect to see several more national titles for young Paul Dalley in the next few years. With his teammates finishing third and fourth in Final A, the next job on the list will be the Open Teams.



## DEFENCE IN DETAIL

Liam Milne



Back again in 2022, Defence in Detail looks at real-life hands from the last six months with a focus on practical plays, counting the hand and logical thinking. These deals are designed to be solvable, so put on your thinking hat and play along as we defend the hand together.

'Breaking the rules' and playing an abnormal card can often be an effective way to solve a defensive problem – whether it is establishing a suit, knocking out an entry or even simply getting off lead.

Sitting in the West seat in a matchpoints tournament, you hold a smattering of honours:

♠ A 9 7 4   ♥ Q 10 8   ♦ K 9 4   ♣ Q 9 6

Your opponents conduct a brief and cheerful auction:

South was expected to pass 2♥ or give preference to 2♠. From their 2NT bid, it sounds like declarer has short majors – likely a doubleton in hearts – and strength in the minors, perhaps a 3-2-4-4 shape or possibly a five-card minor.

Not liking your minor-suit holdings, you select the ♠4 for your lead and see this dummy:

Partner wins the ♠K on the first trick as declarer follows with the ♠2. Partner's spade return goes to the ♠Q and your ace. It isn't clear who has the ♠J, but you suspect it may be declarer from the assumption that they have short hearts.

This looks awkward now. Anything you return could give declarer a trick.

What's the best chance at trick 3?

### Solution:

With declarer marked with minor suit length and strength on the auction, neither a club nor a diamond return appeals. Either suit could be right, but both are risky.

A spade is somewhat passive. If declarer has the ♠J, you give nothing away and get off lead, but you have unblocked the suit while dummy still has an entry in hearts. If partner has it, you have set up a trick for declarer in the dummy – not ideal.

Switching to hearts looks dangerous, but we have theorised that declarer is weak in hearts. If they had ♥K-x, would they not have passed 2♥? With ♥K-x-x they certainly should have. If we are going to play a heart to attacks dummy's entry, which card is best? The ♥8 will be covered by the ♥9 and partner's ♥K, leaving a finesse position against us; the same goes for leading the ♥10.

What about the wacky-looking ♥Q? If declarer wins the trick with the ace, that's dummy's only entry gone, while if they duck, we can happily continue the suit towards partner's king.

This is how the full deal looks:

On a spade at trick 3, declarer makes two spades, one heart, one diamond, three clubs and a trick in the wash in one of the red suits. A minor suit shift also does no harm to declarer. A shift to the heart eight or ten will be covered in dummy and declarer now makes two tricks in the suit.

But the ♥Q gives declarer an impossible problem. Ducking only delays the issue and winning destroys dummy's entry to the fourth spade. In fact, the ♥Q is the only card to beat the contract at this point.

Declarer would have done better to begin unblocking their spade honours under partner's king at trick one to ensure two spade tricks.

**Point to remember:** Without much to go on, work out what the best suit to play is first. Then narrow it down to which CARD to play. Consider the effects of all of the options!

Some like to lead aces against slams, others do not. The normal play in trumps in 6♠ is a low spade to the queen. That would give East a spade trick. Had West led the ♦A, declarer would almost certainly have been one down in the slam. Nigel Rosendorff (N) – Martin Bloom (S) were the only pair to bid 6♠ and Bloom made it after West chose the ♥9 opening lead.

Declarer played the ♥J, queen, king. South continued with the ♥5 to the ace and the ♥10. East ruffed this with the ♠7. South did very well now by discarding the ♦K. Had he over-ruffed with the ♠Q, as some might, he would have lost a trump trick and a diamond.

East returned a diamond. South ruffed, crossed to the ♣K and played the ♠J, capturing East's ♠K. That was worth +1430 and 13 IMPs against the datum of N-S 660.




