OPEN TEAMS SEMI FINAL - SET 3 OF 3

Qualifying first and second, MILNE and HAFFER qualified directly through the semi-finals. From the 3rd through 6th qualifiers, NEILL defeated FISCHER 54-35 and BUCHEN beat VAN DER VLUGT 64-36 in the morning Round of Four.

MILNE chose to play NEILL in the semi-final so HAFFER was left to deal with BUCHEN with the winning teams going through to the final showdown on Saturday.

In the first two sets of the semi-final, both MILNE and HAFFER amassed reasonable cushions. It wasn't over until it was over and the last twelve boards had plenty of twists for the players to deal with.



NEILL landed a heavy blow on the first board of the last set. Neill jumped to a values-purist 3♥ over Hughes' double of 1♠, and now Hughes chose an exploratory 3♠ before launching to slam opposite what sounded like spade values.

Nick Jacob had to find the killing lead of ace of spades and another spade for a ruff. However, it sounded to him like the king was on his right and the opponents had plenty of spades that weren't going anywhere, so he chose the 'safe' trump lead. This worked about as well as every other trump lead against slams and 6♥ was made in comfort; NS -1430.

Milne started describing his hand with a double of Watson's aggressive third-seat 2 multi. That was the end of the describing, with Roeder-Watson working in harmony to work out to play in diamonds. 2 x could have gone for 500, but with a small defensive misstep escaped for 300 for 15-imp swing to NEILL to kick off the deciding set.



Mike Hughes chose to start with a double on the West cards in the passout seat. GeO showed he was serious about the spades with a preemptive-descriptive jump to 3 +, and Neill closed out the auction with 4 +.

The defence led spades and Neill ruffed in dummy to play a diamond. Tislevoll ruffed in and played another spade. Down to bare queen of hearts in the dummy, Neill had had enough and played the queen, overtaking with the king to play another round. Then he went about his business, just losing the obvious two trumps (?); NS -650.



Liam Milne opted instead to show the diamonds initially, hoping to double for takeout later on. James Coutts beat him to it and Milne bid a strong 3♠, suggestive of spade shortness. Coutts made an excellent and trusting bid, jumping to 5♠.

Watson thought the opponents had stumbled into a poor contract and doubled. Milne was quick to disabuse him of this notion.

On the surface declarer has two trumps and a club to lose. Milne trumped the spade lead, played a diamond to the king and a diamond back to the jack and queen. Now the ace king of clubs were cashed, checking for a doubleton queen, before a heart to the ace and a spade ruff.

Down to ♦A-9 in trumps, Milne cashed two more hearts, exited in clubs and claimed. NS -1000 and 8 imps back to MILNE.



Tislevoll could not be denied his slam. He responded 1♥ and jumped to 3♥ strong and forcing next. Jacob tried to slow things down with a meek 4♥. Duly encouraged by the 'fit' opposite, Tislevoll lept to slam.


This wasn't such a bad contract single-dummy with significant chances on a non-spade lead. Unfortunately, Bruce Neill had an easy ♠K lead and now GeO could do not better than drawing two top trumps then rely on the diamond finesse. This failed and he was down two, NS -200.

Instead of showing his spades, Watson chose the non-mainstream repetition of his diamonds. Roeder managed his fine collection with great delicacy, forcing with an allegedly natural 3♣ then continuing with 4♦ when partner appeared uninterested in hearts.

Watson, having limited his hand several times, should have cooperated with a 4♠ cue bid but put a damper on proceedings with a 5♦ sign off. Roeder thought long and hard about raising to the excellent (and cold in practice) 6♦ but eventually trusted his man and passed.

No need to bid slam with the opponents going down in the other room; 6♦ making seven for NS +640 and 13 imps to NEILL. Roeder-Watson were in fact the only North-South in the semi-finals to register a plus on this deal with all three other tables playing 6♥ -2.



Nick Jacob passed smoothly over 4, as his double would be for takeout showing spade shortage.

On a club lead, Neill played ace of hearts and another heart. Jacob took this to play a second club, and declarer played a third heart to Jacob for a further club.

All of a sudden Neill was down to as many trumps as left hand opponent. He would not get to enjoy his hearts and wound up three off, NS +150.

Roeder-Watson had a mix-up of philosophies at the other table. Watson doubled 4♠, either 'values' or 'penalty' or some combination thereof, and Roeder really should have passed this with his balanced heap of defence.

Thinking his partner had spade shortage and not wanting to defend a tencard fit, Roeder removed to 4NT for the minors. Watson uncovered their

4-4 club fit and Milne mercifully did not double.

On repeated trump leads, declarer could only make 9 tricks, NS -200 and 8 imps to MILNE.

MILNE won the set 43-29 and the match 119-66. In the other semi-final, HAFFER defeated BUCHEN 118-41. Saturday's final promised to be an exciting showdown between two fine teams; as always, a little bit of luck would not be unwelcome.




TABLE COUNT TO THE END OF PLAY FRIDAY NIGHT 3894

CUDDLING BY CANDLELIGHT

The week is almost over. A feeling of post-coital reflection has settled over the bridge. Gratitude for what we have: a wonderful, international, face-to-face congress with long-missed friends. Acceptance for what we don't have: the friends who couldn't make it, the victories that eluded us. This is it - the last opportunity. The frenzy, the passion, the chaos: the Ivy Dahler Butler Swiss Pairs.

Take the East cards for this problem: ♠K 6 4 ♥-- ♦K Q 7 3 2 ♣Q 9 7 3 2

You are first to act at favourable vulnerability. Does this hand make you jump in delight? Does anything spring to mind? How will you leap into action?

Julie Jeffries made the mainstream choice of opening, efficiently describing both her minors in one bid: 4NT.

Now let's switch over to the North cards on the same board: ♠A J 7 ♥A 6 4 ♠A 4 ♣A K J 10 5

You are fourth to act at unfavourable vulnerability. If you are lucky, you and your partner may have the auction to yourselves for a change.

Andrew Mill heard the auction proceed 4NT on his left, pass from partner, 5♦ on his right.

Double, he said, calculating how much 7 off not vulnerable would be worth. 5♥, his partner Annette Maluish advanced. Fine, said Andrew, raising Annette to 6♥. (I'm sure he didn't really want to defend anyway...)




Annette had no difficulty racking up 12 tricks in the par contract for +1430.

Andrew had little time to process the auction he had just partaken in before he was faced with his next problem.

♦-- ♥J 10 9 3 **♦**A K Q 9 8 6 5 **♣**9 8

Partner opened 1♥ at favourable vulnerability and David O'Gorman interfered with 1♠. Fine, said Andrew, raising Annette to 6♥. It seemed to work pretty well last time...



David found the best start for the defence by leading the club king. Annette saw that she could discard her clubs on dummy's diamonds, but she wanted to protect against 2-1 trumps with a short diamond. Hence, she cashed the heart ace and crossed to dummy's diamond ace.

The diamond king brought a great disappointment when Julie could trump it, preventing Annette from discarding her two losing clubs and her fate was to go 1 off for -50.

Andrew had been very happy to raise Annette to back-to-back 6♥ contracts, but in match 5 there was to be no raising of partner. In fact, his opponents barely got to raise each other, for his scorecard read:

That's right, Andrew had declared eight out of eight boards. It worked pretty well, too, with he and Annette going +24 over the match. However I don't see any slams being declared, so perhaps Annette had the better of it after all.

Meanwhile, another Mill was brewing up a tasty treat of his own.


Don't ask me how the auction went. Let it suffice to say that, shockingly, Justin Mill was declaring a contract with less than half the deck, no shortages, and only a Moysian trump fit.

This normally wouldn't be so difficult for Justin, but his right-hand opponent gave him a helping hand when she exposed all thirteen cards on the table. The director was summoned; it was established that these were all penalty cards; it was likely the board would be adjusted. Well, if that was the case, why not have some fun?

Try your hand as declarer in 2♠ on the diamond king lead, with the proviso being that you get to nominate each of West's plays.

Justin won the diamond ace, played a club to the 6 and 4, played the heart 7 to the 2 and queen, played a club to the ace to ruff a club with the jack, then exited with a diamond to the jack, 10 and West's spade ace. The heart 10 was returned to dummy's jack, the spade 7 drew East's sole trump, and good clubs were led through West, who naturally had to pitch the heart ace and king. The last four tricks were cross-ruffed high, West underruffing each time, and Justin finished with the mainstream score of +230.

The greatest trick Avi Kanetkar ever pulled was convincing the world he always had his bid. His opponent in the Open Teams Round of 4, Maurits van der Vlugt, had a wry smile on his face when recounting the auction on board 17.



The bank of Avi was open, but the vault was empty. The imaginative 34 overcall took away Marshall Lewis's cheap support for spades, and Maurits couldn't envisage his king-doubleton club being worth a penny.

As Maurits was scoring up his +510, Avi made an observation.

"This never would have been a problem playing my system." And what system is that, Avi?

"Strong jump shifts!"

Yes, the man playing strong jump shifts made a jump overcall on jack-sixth and a queen. Has anyone seen the bank of Avi's riches lately?





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

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DEFENCE IN DETAIL

Liam Milne



Back again in 2022, Defence in Detail looks at real-life hands from the last six months with a focus on practical plays, counting the hand and logical thinking. These deals are designed to be solvable, so put on your thinking hat and play along as we defend the hand together. With four trumps, consider if you can put declarer's trump holding under pressure somehow. If you force them into losing trump control, you will be able to create winning positions out of thin air.

You are West in a national teams final with a moderate balanced hand::

♦AJ76 ♥73 **♦**A843 **♣**983

Your opponents meander into an apparent 4-4 spade fit after your side bids and raises diamonds.



Seeing no appeal in a heart or club lead, you shrug and lead the ace of diamonds which looks like a good idea when dummy appears:

Partner plays the diamond queen at trick one, showing an honour sequence in the suit. Dummy is unexpectedly strong, and partner and declarer hold only 17 points between them for their opening bid and two-level overcall.

Your side is playing an artificial 2• opening, so partner could easily hold six good diamonds and not have opened the bidding. It does not look like partner can enough strength to significantly hinder declarer in clubs or hearts.

What is the best chance to create some tricks for your side?




Solution:

Declarer has 11+ points for their opening bid, so partner has at most 3-4 points outside of their ◆QJTxxx+. This means that declarer's clubs and hearts are both likely to run if we defend passively. The most likely chance to defeat 4♠ is to score several trump tricks. The general strategy for building trump tricks is to weaken declarer's trumps (or dummy's). The only suit that we can force declarer to trump is diamonds, so we must continue with a diamond at trick two.

Declarer ruffs in dummy and leads a spade to partner's 10 and his queen. After winning the ace of spades, what should your next play be?

Of course, we must continue the forcing attack by playing a third round of diamonds even though this concedes a ruff and discard. Declarer has no productive way to use this 'gift' and whichever hand they choose to ruff in, your trumps are growing ever more threatening.

Here is the full hand:



After ace of diamonds, diamond ruffed in dummy, spade to the queen and ace, and a third diamond, declarer has no answer. Whichever hand they ruff this trick in leaves them with no way to pick up your trumps.

If declarer ruffs in dummy, he comes down to bare king while you still have three trumps. If he ruffs in hand, now you hold more trumps than either declarer or dummy and are due two more tricks. 44 eventually goes one down.

Point to remember: When you can work out that there is no future in any of the side suits, the only avenue to build defensive tricks is with trumps. Forcing dummy or declarer to ruff can often produce unexpected windfalls.


THE KLINGER QUIZ

This series of quizzes consist of problems that were faced in real life tournaments. Here is the eighth problem:


You are sitting as East and hear the following auction:



West leads the ♠6: nine – ten – two. East-West leads thirds and fifths. What would you do as East at trick 2?

Solution:

This deal was from an Asia Pacific Teams Championships.



After the ♠6 lead: nine – ten – two against South's 3♣, East needs to assess the spade position. West's ♠6 is consistent with holding 8-7-6 or 6-4. As West chose 2♥ over 2♠, it is tempting to place West with ♠6-4 doubleton and continue with the ♠A to give West a spade ruff. On the actual layout this defence fails. It sets up dummy's ♠K to give declarer a discard later of the ♦8.

There is no urgency to give West a spade ruff. Even if West does have \$\interlightharpoonup 6-4\$, that would give South three spades and there are no obvious winners in dummy on which South could discard a spade loser.

East should switch to a diamond or a club at trick 2. Declarer will then eventually lose two spades, two hearts and a diamond.
