This doesn't always translate into gains at the table, however.

Take this deal from Sunday:

Therese Demarco led her singleton diamond, and there was no way Free could get to ruff a heart while the opponents had communications to receive a diamond ruff. Down 1, -50 and 5 IMPs away.
