I watched BBO most of the day, and saw a variety of great plays, constructive and obstructive bidding that had even the most seasoned players reeling, and some fine defence.

Of course, there was rubbish too, but such is the ugliness and beauty of bridge.

I was sent this fantastic writeup by Nick Jacob about Justin Mill, part of ZIGGY, SWPT winners and is from the quarter finals of the National Open Teams.

As well as being a worthy contender for "Play of the Year", the deal also showcases an effective bidding sequence which started at a high level..


"One in a Million"

Justin Mill is one of Australia's finest talents. His partner, Rodrigo Garcia da Rosa, originally from Uruguay, is now one of Argentina's best players. He was part of the team which won the World Youth Open Championships in Opatija, Croatia in 2015, to which Australia also sent a youth team.

People who know the two young stars have been excited to see what they can produce as partnership. Take this board, where Justin found a beautiful line of play in the quarter finals of the 2023 National Open Teams in Australia.

Round 8, Board 9, North deals, EW vulnerable



Justin and Rodrigo brushed aside Michael Courtney's preempt to breeze into the grand slam. The contract was excellent. Trumps breaking 2-1 would allow declarer to draw trumps and claim on a crossruff. Three trumps in East would allow declarer to draw trumps and establish the thirteenth trick in hearts. Hence, Justin played a small trump to-


East's club discard posed a problem for declarer. Had East held seven clubs – which looked a nearcertainty on the auction – declarer would have been unable to trump a club low on the table without being overruffed. Hearts 4-3 would still provide the 13th trick, so Justin turned his attention to that suit. A heart to the ace was followed by a diamond to the ace. VK was cashed for a club discard, but



West's club discard on the third round of hearts showed that this suit would not break either.

Justin trumped the heart low and took stock. East was now marked to be 0526 shape. Joan Butts' ♠J would prevent a full crossruff, so Justin set about pruning East's idle cards for an exquisite ending.

◆K was cashed before declarer trumped his third diamond on the table. Justin now took the marked spade finesse to reach the following ending:



When declarer continued with ♠Q from hand, East was caught in declarer's entry shifting squeeze. A heart discard would allow declarer to overtake the spade with dummy's king, a heart would be trumped to fell East's queen, and dummy could be reached with a club ruff to cash the good heart for trick 13.

A club discard fared no better. Declarer could duck the spade in dummy, remaining in hand to trump East's last club. Now a heart ruff to hand allowed declarer to win trick 13 with that precious club.

3. Confirming all Key Cards

4. ♦K, no ♥K5. Last Train

Lead: **♣**K

With his opponents failing to reach grand slam at the other table, Justin's one-in-a-million play was rewarded with +1510 and 11 IMPs.

Towards the end of the epic day (and I am exhausted just watching), there was a deal that illustrated how a balanced near useless hand could provide the vital extra trick declarer required in a 4♥ contract:

You are declaring 4♥ from the South hand, after East opens a weak 2♠ in third seat.

West leads a spade to the queen. Your play.

- **7** 10 5 4

Your first instinct is to grab the first trick by ruffing. You note that dummy has two good cards, ♣Q and ♥10. You have nine top tricks. Where can you look for a 10th?

The hand is an example of combining your chances. You expect your RHO to have a 6-3-2-2 shape (with the likelihood that one of the doubletons is in your longest suit, hearts.)

Win the first trick and try playing a low diamond at trick two. The defence will win and play another spade. You trump again, and play ◆A and another diamond, finding East has three diamonds. Ruff the next spade (you are down to ▼AK now), draw two rounds of trumps and cross to ♣Q to draw the last trump (from West, as expected). You can discard a club from hand, and claim the last three tricks, +450.

An alternative (and simpler) line is to draw two rounds of trumps at tricks two and three then play three rounds of clubs. When East can't ruff, you have ♥10 to ruff the fourth club. Only 10 tricks but your game is home.



Problem 11 solution

The deal comes from Stage 1 of the 2008 Australian Open Team Selection.



NS had a nice auction, but chose the wrong slam, as 6♥ is unbeatable. Still, they would have made 6♦, but for West' clever lead, ♣7. East won and tried to decipher the meaning of the lead. West obviously started with ♣Q-J-7-5-3. What was the seven all about?


East worked out that it was a suit-preference lead, asking for an unusual return. East shifted to a heart and that was one down for +12 IMPs.

Open datum: NS 670. Three pairs made 6♥, once doubled and once redoubled.

Women's datum: NS 480. Three EW pairs saved in 5♠ and two NS pairs were doubled in 5♥.

SOLUTION TO DOUBLE DUMMY PROBLEM 9

South leads a top club and throws a heart if West does not cover. Now declarer draws hearts and the rest is trivial. It is more interesting if West covers. Now declarer ruffs •A high and draws trumps, finessing and declarer can now reach the good •J.



South to lead with spades as trumps - North-South to win all of the remaining seven tricks. Solution in tomorrow's bulletin.


