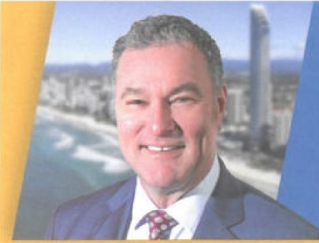

Tim Runting is the Tournament Organiser and Kim Ellaway the Manager. Any problems with the event see either one of them. Kim can be contacted on 0412 064903 at any time during the congress.

Colour Coding – Open = Light and Dark Blue, Under 1500 = Orange, Intermediate = Light and Dark Yellow, Restricted = Light and Dark Green, Novices = Maroon, Open Matchpoint Swiss Pairs and the Open Monday Butler Pairs = Orange, 0-500 Matchpoint Swiss Pairs and the 0-500 Monday Butler Pairs = Purple. Rookie/0-50/Walkins = Fuchsia. Coloured Flags will identify your seating, section results and the areas that you play within.

Entry Fees – Entry Fees for the events are as follows – Pairs Championship: \$165 per player, Teams Championship: \$780 per team, Weekend Matchpoint Swiss Pairs: \$130 per player, Monday Butler Swiss Pairs: \$75 per player, Rookie Pairs: \$25 per player, Under 50 Masterpoint Pairs (1 session): \$25 per player, Under 50 Masterpoint Pairs (2 sessions) \$55 per player, Under 50 Butler Pairs (2 sessions) \$55 per player Ivy Dahler Butler Swiss Pairs: \$105 per player, Seres McMahon Matchpoint Swiss Pairs \$75 per player, Friday Novice Swiss Pairs: \$75 per player. If you have not paid, you must see Pele at the Bridge Administration Desk before play starts. **It is not too late to enter the Ivy Dahler Butler Pairs, Friday Novice Pairs, Seres McMahon Matchpoint Swiss Pairs, however entries for these events close 2.00 pm Thursday.**

Scoring Issues - “The Scoring Liaison Officer is Toni Bardon. She will act as liaison between players and the Scoring Unit. Any problems and concerns you have about scoring and results should be addressed to Toni – she has a desk outside the Scoring Room. Scoring Area Phone Number is 0456587765 – accepts text messages only.

Substitutes – If you need substitutes during the week, please contact Toni at the Scoring Desk.

Dinner Dance – Saturday 25th February 7.30 pm – there will be 10 people to a table. Music will be provided by the band “CAPTAIN WOW”. Players must make their own arrangements to obtain a ticket for the Dance. Pick up a table list from the Dinner Dance Table located next to the Scoring Area and return as soon as possible. Dinner Dance bookings close 5.00 pm Wednesday. All players will be charged \$20 to attend the dinner dance and to non-bridge players \$50.00. From Match 11 in the teams, table allocation will be available. Numbers are limited so don't delay.

Coffee – We run a small Coffee ‘outlet’ for your benefit. It is situated in the main foyer to the right of the main entrance. Coffee/Tea/Hot Chocolate is \$4.00 a cup. The coffee is made from freshly ground coffee beans, it is not instant coffee. The Bridge Coffee outlet is run by volunteers (usually friends and family of the Organizers) – so please bear this in mind.

Lunches – The Convention Centre Kiosks will sell a few sandwiches, salads and sausage rolls.

Courtesy Bus – One Courtesy Bus will be available to take you to and from the Convention Centre. Book through the Bus Driver Barry (onsite) or ring 0418 747 078. The Gold Coast Congress Bus will pick up and return visiting players who are residing within a reasonable distance from the Gold Coast Convention Centre. The bus service is mainly for those who need the service. The bus will loop from the Convention Centre up Surf Parade to Wharf Road then Old Burleigh Road, Broadbeach Boulevard to Alexandra Avenue then Surf Parade then to Convention Centre however a call to Barry is best so he can keep an eye out for you.

Teaching Sessions – Any Celebrity Teaching Session held will be publicized in the Bulletin or on our website so keep an eye out for these.

Parking - You can get weekly tickets from the Bridge Administration Desk for \$60.00 – that's a saving of \$36.00 if you plan to play all 8 days. If you wish to park and pay daily, it will cost you \$12.00 a day and you can do it from the machines. We will be selling weekly parking tickets from latish Friday 17th February if you wish to take advantage of this fabulous deal. A weekly parking ticket also gives you multiple entries within the day.

HATS – 61st CELEBRATION – Wednesday Morning and Afternoon SESSIONS - We have had such fun with this over the years that theme session is here to stay.

Zephyr Education INC Update

My name is Carmel Martin, a co-founder of Zephyr Education and its treasurer.

For the few who don't know, Zephyr helps those affected by domestic and family violence to resume their education – usually within 24 to 48 hours of receiving a request for assistance.

We provide (mostly) children in Domestic Violence shelters, Family Service organisations and outreach services with some or all of their school needs - as and when required – on approval only, which approval is frugally and carefully assessed. We don't pay into any private accounts and often pay directly to the school. The range of what Zephyr pays for includes: The full book list specific to the child's year and school; full uniform including shoes, socks, hats; swimwear; lunchbox and water bottle; resource fees, iPads and laptops - an expensive, yet indispensable learning tool.

Our aim is solely to have that child, the saddest and most vulnerable victims of domestic violence,



look like every other school child, so they do not feel out of place, nor appear less valuable than others, nor attract the eye of a potential bully and in the hope that they can resume their education successfully.

Our strong belief is that education is the only way through this scourge of violence that touches so many. My friend, Bill Morgan said that Zephyr resonated with him because it brought to mind his grandfather's words that you owed your children two things – a good upbringing and an education – the rest was up to them. Zephyr can't do much about

their upbringing but we can certainly make the possibility of being educated, a reality for the children who come into Zephyr's orbit - from those tiny preppies to big kids needing size 12 shoes.

This is the 10th year Zephyr has been in operation and the bridge community has been right beside us from the very beginning starting with my home club QCBC. The wider bridge community continues to support Zephyr with club charity days and individual donations. The QBA again has Zephyr as its charity

at the 2023 Gold Coast Congress. The value of this exposure is incalculable and I can't begin to thank you for the support you give us.

When my sister Isabella – Zephyr's president, promised to stop registering shelters once we reached the magic number of 25, she lied!

We now support 128 in Queensland, 12 in Tasmania, 24 in Western Australia, 5 in NSW, 1 in Darwin and three in the ACT – that's 170 domestic and family violence shelters and outreach organisations.

Last financial year we spent \$560,000 providing support. This represented an increase of 19% on the previous year. For the six weeks from 1 December 2022 we had spent \$190,000 - \$87,000 of which was on uniforms, and we distributed over 100 laptops in that period. We know that Zephyr now supports more than 3000 children each year. We receive no government funding and yet Zephyr has become an acknowledged game changer in the sector.

We don't meet the children we help nor their mothers, but from the emails received from the managers of the organisations we support, it's plain that Zephyr's role is vital, and, often enough, life-changing. One wrote: 'Thank you so much Zephyr for the work that you do... It is an absolute privilege to be able to give a Zephyr laptop to this young person who has had such a tough few years, it will truly make her Christmas and it's all because of the work you do.'

"I hope you know what a massive impact your work has on the families we support. Giving young people the uniforms and supplies they need to attend school enables them to have a level playing field, build their confidence, self-esteem and opportunity to receive an education and create friendships that can be life changing. Our mums are truly grateful that they do not have to worry that their children are starting school with obvious deficits and they can focus on rebuilding their ruptured relationships... I am witnessing it and t's fantastic...thank you!"

And another:

"As always, I am so grateful for the support you provide our families! You should have seen this little boy on his first day of school with his uniform and books ready to go. Instead of being stressed his mum was able to relax and enjoy watching her baby start school. Your support has a huge impact on the lives of women and children and we can't thank you enough."

Another said this to us:

"Just a brief line, Isabella, to thank you so much for meeting our request this morning and so promptly too. We are left breathless by the abilities and generosity of Zephyr. Please thank your team."

I often wonder what alternative options our families would have if it was not for Zephyr Education as there is very limited support available. As a service that works with the most vulnerable families, we are extremely grateful to be in a position where we can advocate (not have to beg) on behalf of our clients.

And this:

"Thanks Barb, for everything. Kelsey, Isabella and yourself have been amazing. Myself and the family have been very grateful. Wish you could have been there to see the smile of the youngest girl when she tried on her uniforms.

I hope you could feel it though, I'm sure it beamed all around the world."

As they say, praise is worth more coming from others and these quotes provide an insight into exactly what you are helping to achieve. Our focus is, and always has been, on the children and their education. We assist the carers of all children who fall within our scope, including mothers, fathers, grandparents, foster carers and guardians.

Zephyr continues to be supported by a growing number, (over 40), talented and dedicated volunteers. We are *all* volunteers. No one receives any remuneration or allowances for their work. We operate from rent free premises and last year our unavoidable expenses, such as insurance, amounted to 1.9% of donations making virtually all of your tax deductible donation work for our cause. We were-

n't looking for something to do – we stumbled on the need and thought we could do something. You've all got behind us and huge numbers of children have felt less alone and a little more loved.

If you would like to make a donation, we will be rattling collection boxes and have eftpos machines on hand. Kim Ellaway in the main office has kindly volunteered to accept donations as well.

GCC Congress and QBA are supporting Zephyr Education Inc again in 2023.

A huge thank you to the many bridge players who continue to support Zephyr Education.

Zephyr provides the full educational needs of children affected by domestic and family violence in 128 Queensland shelters and associated organisations, as well as 12 in Tasmania, 24 in WA, 5 in NSW, 1 in Darwin and three in the ACT – that's 170 in total.

They are *all* volunteers at Zephyr and no one is reimbursed for personal expenses - let alone paid a wage. No rent is paid for premises and overheads are minimal, so virtually all money donated by you is spent helping these vulnerable children fit in and be given the opportunity of a full education.

Collections will be held during the congress before play and after lunch so please give generously to this very practical and worthwhile charity. I will also take donations at the office.

Air Conditioning

Player Comfort

There are approximately 2,000 players at the venue, and ensuring the comfort of *all* players can be a challenge.

Over time the organisers have noticed that there are areas where it is particularly cold due to air pockets coming from the air conditioner. The room sometimes leaks from condensation due to the amount of air conditioning we are using.

What you *can* do to improve your personal comfort level:

- ◆ as advertised in all communication, please bring a jumper or something to keep you warm;
- ◆ we have a supply of pashminas and wraps so please just ask a caddy who will bring it to you - we do ask that you return these to the caddy at the end of the session.
- ◆ if it is obviously too cold for you and those around you, please ask the caddy to report the table number and section to Kim Ellaway, who will bring her thermometer to see if it can be fixed or perhaps we can move the table.

Things you can do that will not improve your comfort level:

- ◆ discuss the issue with a director or the scoring staff
- ◆ discuss it with the Recorder.

Next cab off the rank is Paul Lavings, author of the column at left. Paul won the 1978 Open Pairs in partnership with the enigmatic Don Evans.

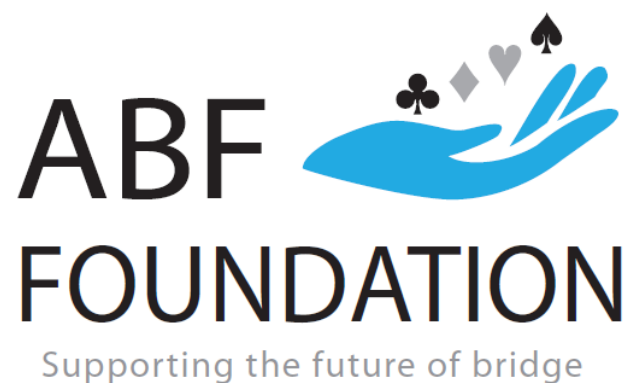
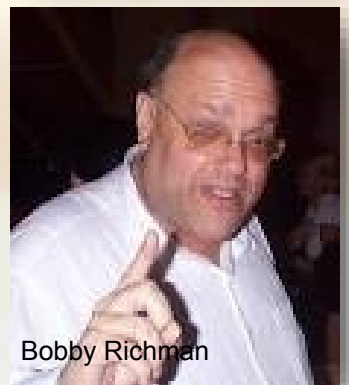


Paul and Don took out the double gold that year, winning the Gold Coast Teams in partnership with Frank Theeman and Tony Ong.



The Daily Bulletin reported that Seamus played 4♣ from the East seat on a heart lead. He won, crossed to dummy, and led ♠7.

Nothing fancy, but nearly everyone else simply led ♠Q off dummy, failing to cater for the actual layout.

That gave him 12 tricks. He then took the ruffing club finesse, using diamonds as entries, to win all 13 tricks.

In the three session final, Ron Klinger and I took the lead by the end of the first session and were never headed after that.

Bobby Richman - Matthew Thomson were second, with Tom Jacob - Richard Jedrychowski third. Beautiful!

GC Teams

For the contenders, the teams schedule is not quite so laid back. Until her death last year, Mary McMahon had played at Surfers every year since it began, most often with Tim Seres. I thus felt honoured to be on Tim’s team this year. After 10 Swiss rounds, the semi finalists were Val Cummings, Wally Scott, Warren Lazer, Pauline Gumbly (first on ANA Hotel, Level 2) The Indonesian team of T. Asbi, L. Bojoh, R. Tobing, A. Playing 6NT you need to score two out of the three finesses in spades, hearts, diamonds. That is a 50% chance. In 6♠, you need only the trump finesse if spades are 3-2.

Michael Cornell won the club lead, cashed ♠A, finessed ♠J and drew the last trump. He then eliminated the clubs and cashed ♥AK. When he exited with the third heart, it did not matter who won. The defender had to lead diamonds or concede a ruff-and-discard.

In one semi final, CORNELL won easily against CUMMINGS. Things were close all the way in the other semi final between SERES and ASBI, a leading Indonesian team. The final margin was 4 IMPs, so this fine piece of declarer play by Ron Klinger more than accounted for the difference:

East led ♣K, then switched to ace and another heart. Ron won ♥K, ruffed a club, then (key play) finessed ♠J. After ruffing another club, he crossed to dummy for the last time with ♠K, and led a fourth club. When West discarded a heart, Ron ruffed with ♦9. It won - phew!

He exited with ♠A, which West (now left with trumps only) had to ruff and lead a diamond. Ron finessed ♦J, and led his last heart. West ruffed again and was endplayed. Nine tricks! +470 and plus 50 in the other room gave us 11 IMPs. Well done.

The final was also close. Seres led Cornell by 3 IMPs after two of the four sessions, and still led by only 8 IMPs with five boards to go in the final session. But the last five boards went to Seres by 27 IMPs to 3, so Seres - Nagy, Klinger - Neill won the teams by 32 IMPs, and Klinger - Neill had won the double: pairs and teams. Perfect!

Correction of Scores

from the 2023 Gold Coast Information Manual

Scoring Area Phone Number is 0456 587 765 – accepts text messages only

After each session, a printout of the results for each pair or team will be made available. For the last session of a stage of an event, you may obtain a copy on request from the Scoring Enquiries Desk – located in the Administration Office during the pairs and outside the playing area thereafter.

If you believe that there is a mistake, you need to follow this procedure:

1. on the board where you believe that there was an error, agree with your opponents that the score was entered incorrectly;
2. make the correction on your printout and have them sign it;
3. give the corrected printout to the Scoring Liaison Officer, Toni Bardon, under the sign “SCORING ENQUIRIES” next to the Scoring Room. She will check that you have provided all the necessary information.

The correction will be made by the scorers during the following session and a new personal printout will be made available for you to collect.

Agreed scoring errors need to be advised within the scoring correction period for the session in which the error occurred. The scoring correction periods are displayed prominently near the scoreboards.

At the conclusion of the scoring correction period, scores become final and, under the Laws of Bridge, no further changes can be made. This is critical for the last rounds when the correction period is limited, and scorers may not pick up anomalies.

You are responsible for your own actions - or lack thereof. The Scoring team may be advised of potential scoring errors via text to 0456-587-765 (receives texts only). Include the following information: Event, Session/Match, Pair number, Board

number, Contract, Declarer, Score, What you believe is correct.

The scoring team has a protocol to follow to determine if a result is manifestly wrong. If it is not accepted or if the error relates to the number of tricks taken, you will need to obtain written confirmation from your opponents as described above.

Systems and System Cards

System regulations are published on the GCC My-ABF website after 1 January 2023.

Each pair is required to have two current ABF approved, systemically identical system cards on the table for the opposing pair before the start of each round.

Overseas players will be permitted to use New Zealand and WBF system cards in addition to ABF cards. ABF system cards and guide to completing them are available at this site: <http://www.abf.com.au/member-services/systemcards/>.

GREEN and BLUE systems are permitted without restriction.

RED systems and BROWN STICKER conventions are permitted in all events except for Restricted and Novice Pairs and Teams Championships, all 0-50 Masterpoint events, Rookie Pairs, Friday Novice Pairs and Restricted Butler Swiss Pairs.

In addition, in these events, the CTD may also further restrict a pair from playing any method which the director judges may not be readily understood by a significant proportion of players in the field. Eligible pairs may claim Protected Pair status in all events with the exception of the major Final of the Open Pairs Championship.

Provided the required system submission (detailed below) has been complied with, YELLOW systems will be allowed in the Open Teams Championship from Round 3 onwards.

They may not be played against a contestant with a current position in the lower two-thirds of the field (decimals rounded up).

Pairs intending to play a YELLOW system must provide the Tournament Organiser with an adequately completed ABF Standard system card and

West should pass 3♣x. East has not sought your opinion, therefore leave 3♣ alone. To locate West's minor, East could have asked initially with 2NT. A sound treatment in the given auction is for East to redouble, saying 'Please make the cheapest bid and then pass my next bid.' East would redouble 2♥, West would bid 2♠ and East's 3♣ must then be passed. (Clearly it is important that both partners are aware of this use of redouble.)

The cost in 3♣x would be 300. It was much more in 3♦x. North led a trump, won by ♦Q. South, shifted to ♠A, then ♠Q, won by the king. West led

a low heart, won by South who cashed ♠J, ♦A and continued with ♠8. West discarded a heart.

South continued with ♦K and ♦2 to keep declarer in hand. West made just two diamonds, ♠K and ♥A, five down, minus 1100.

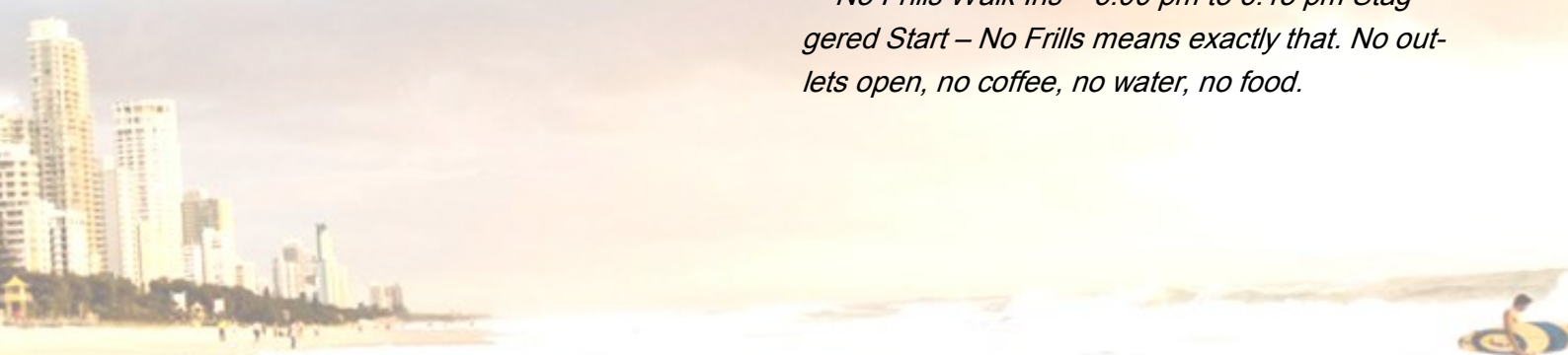

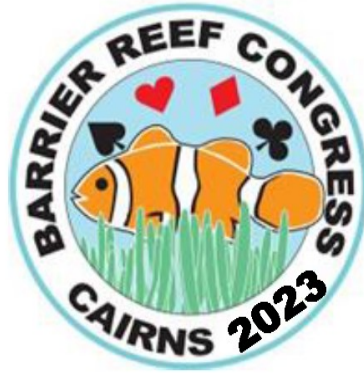

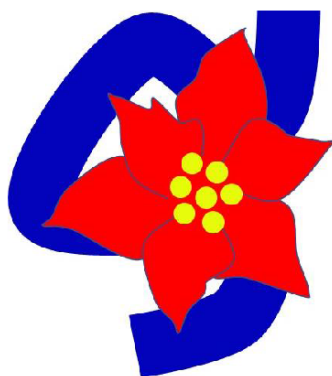
