Nigel Rosendorff approached me this morning, eager to give credit to Richard Brightling for his thoughtful play on the deal below:

Bloom led a spade to Rosendorff's ace, and ♠7 was returned. Brightling cashed ♥A, noting Bloom's ♥Q.

Using the theory of restricted choice (Bloom had no choice but to contribute ♥Q, thus a singleton), Richard crossed to a club honour and ran ♥10.

When that won, he cashed ♥K and played on clubs, discarding his losing spade from hand as Rosendorff impotently followed suit.

Richard conceded a trump and ♦A, claiming 10 tricks.

This turned out to be a poor score at the table (12 IMPs), as at many tables EW chose to play 3NT, down on a spade lead.

The declarer going down in 4♥ banged down a second round of trumps instead of running ♥10, and now a trump promotion meant only nine tricks.

Rosendorff applauded Richard Brightling's play, great to hear in a competitive bridge event.

Rubber with Richard or the case of the double voids

Long ago, when rubber bridge and hand dealing were the rage, the hands could be wild. A lack of attention to cutting the deck and shuffling led to what we now think of as 'Goulash' hands.

A couple of years ago we played a session of Goulash bridge at 'Grannes', the beautiful country residence of Greg Lewin near Stawell in the Grampians, Victoria.


Stawell is well known to Australians as the home of the Stawell Gift, a footrace competition which has

been held around Easter since 1878, and nowadays offers a prize of \$40,000 for first place.

The hands we played at Greg's home were difficult for most of those present (only 12 people in 2021 due to Covid).

You need to have been to the NZ Congress in Hamilton, New Zealand a few times in the 80s to be prepared for Goulash bridge, where the suggestion is to open at game level or beyond when you are dealt a good freak.

The two deals which follow feature Richard Brightling, once a rubber bridge fan. Richard lives in the Batemans Bay area on the NSW South Coast, having retired there from Canberra with housemate and longtime friend Leone Moffat.



Richard has seen his fair share of bridge deals, and remembers many, a skill that I have not mastered to the same effect.

In the 1970s, Richard was living in London, and frequented a small rubber bridge club called "Grand Slam Bridge Club", where the ante was 50p a 100.

I can find no mention of the club now, but it was on the ground floor of a terrace house near Marble Arch.

On the first deal, Richard held

Richard cannot remember the state of the rubber, so the 3♠ bid by East would probably have meant that either side was keen to clinch it.

Richard was pretty sure a tactical underbid would end the auction, so he tried a pragmatic 6♥.

Andrew Kaldor, a prominent Sydney fabric merchant had been having a "hard day at the office", so when the final hand of the rubber appeared, Kim Morrison, sitting to Richard's left, announced "Whatever you bid, I'm going to double."

However, when Richard opened 1♦, Kim changed his mind, bidding 1♠ instead. After the auction escalated to the six-level, with neither side knowing who could make what, Richard made what he suspected was going to be the winning decision, "saving in 7♣".

Indeed, 6♠ needs a diamond lead to defeat the contract, while 7♣ is laydown.

Hand from the Far East

Some of our top players have been invited to share interesting play hands from recent tournaments.

A big thank you to Paul Lavings, who contributed the following deal from the 2023 Far East.



The Hong Kong NS were tasked with defeating 1NT. Paul comments that there are many ways to defeat 1NT, but only one way to make 1NT.

Here's the full hand:

The preemptive(!) nature of the 1♠ overcall made it difficult for EW to reach their better spot, a partscore in hearts. As it is, the heart suit is stranded if declarer plays on hearts when gaining the lead, and NS can easily fulfil their quota of seven defensive tricks.

Paul could see that, so hoping for something good to happen (♣A in the North hand would be fantastic), he routinely ducked ♣Q at trick one. He won ♠A perforce at trick two, and played a club to

the queen and South's ace. South switched to a low diamond to the jack and North's king, and South cleared the spade suit as Lavings threw ♥9.

He cashed ♣J and played a club to ♣9, North discarding a low heart and ♣K, on which North discarded a spade.

This was the ending:

Paul, reading the situation perfectly, threw North in with ♦A and waited for the lead away from ♥K for the seventh trick.

North should, of course have foreseen the endplay and discarded a spade to avoid the ignominy.

On this deal from the first qualifying session of the Mitchell Board-a-Match Teams, the field played game. Slam needs a favourable club position and the spade finesse, but that all comes in.

Can you construct a plausible sequence of plays that might lead to declarer failing to take 12 tricks in 6NT? Pablo Lambardi, East, heard South open 1♦, 3NT from North and 6NT from South.

He led ♦Q!

This was consistent with East holding ♦KQ10. Can you blame declarer too much for winning the ace and playing on diamonds, not spades, thereby snatching defeat from the jaws of victory?

Got 'ya!

Justine Beaumont, ex-BFACT President and ex-Organiser of October's Canberra in Bloom event, made a tricky play that led to success in defeating Jane Reynolds' game.

She led ♥A, and studied dummy before switching to - ♣7(!), ♣8, ♣10, ♣A.

Declarer drew trumps in one round, then played a diamond to dummy's king, and a diamond to Ian Thomson's ♦10, ♦8 and Justine's ♦Q.

Justine played ♦A, which allowed Jane to ruff in dummy. She now ran ♠J to Justine's queen, one down.

A far-sighted defence which gave declarer just enough rope to hang herself. Justine could see that declarer could hardly fail if she held three spades to the ace-king, as her ♠Q would come tumbling down.
