George Gall from Bathurst

George is living an amazing life. At the age of 93 he is the oldest member of the Bathurst and District Bridge Club and still has a zest for life.

He was the Treasurer of the club for 16 years until 2023, when the new constitution said he was not allowed to stand again. However, he is still a member of the committee.

He plays bridge at least three times a week and at least once a fortnight plays on-line bridge on his tablet. He is one of the club's characters.

Born in Hungary in 1930, George arrived at the Bathurst Migrant Camp on 1 Jan 1950.

Initially he worked as a labourer in a wood yard, then on the Menindee to Broken Hill water pipeline, preparing employees' wages.

He joined the Police Force in 1956 and became the Detective Sergeant in charge of the Bathurst district. He then moved his career to insurance.

George loves the Bathurst country lifestyle, it's proximity to Sydney, and its similarity to the town in Hungary from which he came.

George has been in Rotary, has a Police Good Conduct Medal, and has won a Paul Harris Fellowship. He is also listed as a "Bathurst Living Legend"

George has been playing bridge for over 30 years and he calls it a "wonderful pastime" and says it keeps a person's mind young.



Mary Fagan from Cowra

Jean Mary Fagan has been a much-loved member of the Cowra Bridge Club since its inception. During that time, she has played countless games of Bridge locally and away, always proficiently, always graciously.

Jean Mary was born in July 1926 and grew up in Sydney. In 1950 she married Tony Fagan and moved to a property at Lyndhurst where they raised their four children.

In the early 1970's, she was 'persuaded' to take up Bridge. Jean Mary drove to Orange each week to learn the skills from her friend Fran Weily, and then as she became hooked, she enrolled in 13 weeks of lessons in Orange. She later joined the Bathurst Bridge Club and travelled from Lyndhurst to Bathurst to play each Wednesday evening. Around 1992, Jean Mary also travelled to Cowra to play Bridge each Monday.

When she moved to Cowra in 1994, she joined the Cowra Bridge Club. Her style of play has always been 'quality basic Bridge'. During this year alone, she has been the winner on 14 occasions. Because Cowra is a social club, partnerships vary each week, so Jean Mary plays with all levels of players. She currently plays twice a week at the Bridge Club, as well as twice a week socially where she mentors newer players.

When asked what has Bridge given her, Jean Mary replied 'a long life, mental stimulation and many friends of all ages'.

He Joined the ABF Council in 1989 serving as Its Secretary, then Treasurer until 1997.

John and Marcia have organised numerous major national and International Bridge Tournaments including the Summer Festival of Bridge in Canberra for 10 years, the Sydney Spring Nationals, the 1985 Far East Championships and the 1989 World Bridge Championships. He was appointed to the Australian Bridge Committee of Honour in 1995.

Having served on the NSW Council in two earlier periods, he rejoined in 2009 and was Chair from 2018 to 2022. He is a Life Member of the NSWBA. He was instrumental in the purchase of a Sydney CBD Commercial Property which continues as the Headquarters of Bridge in NSW.


In his time, he has seen the Australian bridge Community grow to over 33,000 registered players.

ITS Match 5. Senior moment




David's take: "I opened 1NT, followed by three passes. As I went to write the contact in my scorebook, Kate said "Are you passing"?

"I then realised that Axel had doubled, so I redoubled as required (playing SWINE) and it went pass - pass to North who scrambled to 2.

"We doubled that but did not beat it. So instead of me passing in ignorance for +380 we scored -180."

Match 8. Very Deep



Richard Ward: "14 pairs across all four fields reached 6 from West, most going down when,

not surprisingly, they failed to drop the singleton
♦K offside. The question is, 'How to make 12 tricks, specifically after the ♣K lead'?


Deep Finesse recommends ruffing a club, playing A-Q, followed by A and a club ruff, noting that the clubs are now high.

Then spades from the top. Sooner or later South will trump and have to return a club or a heart.

Simple really ... Two East-Wests were not tested because they quietly collected +1100 after 1♦ - 2♠ - X - all pass."

The successful pairs in 6 were Bill and Jodi Tutty from ACT Open and Wendy Jettner -Tracey O'Driscoll from SA Women. Both received the \$7 lead. The latter pair were +103 on datums in their match, quite possibly a record.

Match 11. As wild as it gets



That's one possible auction. Or Maybe 3♥ Michaels if available. No way North should sell out to 4♥, and yet 11 Easts were allowed to play it. Seven made it and four went down. To make it on an unlikely spade lead you have to cash the ♥A and play clubs. Not likely!

Eight Norths missed the spade fit, going down in $5 \Rightarrow x$. Two Easts played $5 \Rightarrow$, which is par. Four Norths went to $5 \Rightarrow$. Understandable with 7-5, though a Lightner double appeals.

The first two pairs qualified for the 1974 Australian Open Team to join Tim Seres, the automatic selection, with Roelof Smilde, the partner of his choice.

The team toured New Zealand and won the 120-board Test Match 278 - 219.

In 1978 the selection method was changed from Butler to Teams.

The **Women's Butler Trials** were the selection vehicle for the 1974 Australian Women's Team
