








Match 6




3NT is pretty clear here. It takes an unlikely heart lead to shoot it. If you choose 3♠ instead, it's normal to agree that partner's only choice are to raise or bid 3NT. Having said that, 5♦ is cold, while 3NT/N has no play on a heart lead.



Many reached 4♥ here and most made it. East overcalls 2♣ then leads the ♠K.

Spades can wait, so West should overtake to lead the ♣Q, Three rounds of clubs turn East's ♥Q-9 into the setting trick, because dummy has to ruff the third club high.


Match 7




Should West sit 3NT? Maybe, though it turns out that 4♥ is a make. (5♣ only makes if you hook twice in diamonds. Unlikely.)

In fact 3NT sometimes made on a spade lead. Did South duck a club? If so, declarer might play two hearts, decide they are not breaking, then run the •J for nine tricks. Or were spades blocked??

Match 8




As East I thought it was the time to try 3NT on Qx, like the experts do. When the first trick went ♥A-5-3-9, I thought I was in with a show but Stephen Mendick cashed out for four off.



Three pairs across the two events bid this 6♣, including Axel and Kate, presumably via relay.

It's not a great spot but the breaks are friendly.




Here the partnership needs to be able to diagnose the heart void. Only two of 23 bid it, including the Richmans. I texted to find their auction:



6♣ is cold on the beaks. 6♠ is pretty good, if played from the short side,

North has to lead a low heart to shoot it. Unlikely.





Curiously, there were a couple of -790s. Presumably South passed North's double.


It's a question of agreed style. If the double of 4♠ is typically a strong notrump, it's right for South to pass. Here you pay out to the pure takeouters.

Four out of 14 made this 4♥, presumably by leading a heart to the 10. Well done, but **Bridge CCAnalyser** says Ace-another is better at 78%, compared to 71% for the finesse line



Double fits see people do strange things. 6♣x is par this time.



Butler bleat

Over the two weeks, there have been 20 sessions of Swiss Butler IMPs, two matchpoint pairs sessions, and two Swiss Teams sessions.

Not only that, there have been two or three separate Butler events running on most days of the second week.

Too much of a good thing?

I think so. Teams events – however they are scored – are more social and also fairer in a way.

One of the Butler problems is running into a set of boards where the points run the other way.

If you sit and watch your opponents bid and make a close but cold vulnerable game, you know you will lose about six IMPs. There are always underbidders and plotchers to skew the datum.

In teams, you might lose 10 or 12 IMPs on those hands but at least **you know whom to blame**.
