




# Doubled Game from the Final Round

This hand caused some big swings in the final round of the Teams.

Match 6:

North opened with only 9 HCP, but with a great 6/5 shape and having both Majors. South jumped to 4♠ with fivecard support.

West's Double was clearly showing a good hand, and it is hard for East to respond to the Double at that level.

Despite getting Doubled in 4♠ with a combined 16 HCP and making 10 tricks for a great score of +590, the board turned out to be flat when the same thing happened at the other table.

In the Novice section, Robyn Rogers opened 1 and her partner Joan Lenehan replicated that auction, and also scored a flat board.

In fact, around the room, NS scoring +590 was far and away the most common outcome.

In the Open Teams match between first and second the board was also flat, but with both North-South pairs getting pushed to 5♠ (over a making 5♣) and getting doubled there and going for NS - 100.

Although  $5\clubsuit$  makes, it is very hard to bid to game after North-South have the auction  $1\spadesuit$  p  $4\spadesuit$ .

Well done to all of the North players who choose to open 1♠ on this hand.

The power of shape!


















### **Hard Game To Bid**

This hand caused some difficulties in the final round of the teams. Match 6



The Intermediate teams runners up, Kit Meyers and Kerry Rymer had the following auction:

North jumped to 34 on their rebid to show around 16+ points and six-Spades. Their hand is clearly very powerful, with the great Diamond side suit and the void in Clubs, however the Spade suit is not the best.

South chose to pass  $3\spadesuit$ , and missed a game.

Fortunately the opposing North-South also played in 3.

In the Open Field, 20 Pairs bid and made game. 15 pairs missed game. Sadly 5 pairs bid to the wrong game or slam and went down.

It is a tough hand to bid.

I like the option of North jumping to 3♦ on their rebid. That implies 5+♠, 4+♦ and I recommend that a jump shift shows 18 – 19 points, both in no-Trumps, and when jumping rebidding a new suit.

It could easily be the case that the best game is Diamonds. Partner might have a singleton Spade and five Diamonds, and game is likely to make, even if they are minimum.

On the auction that Kit and Kerry had, I do have sympathy for South passing. They only have 7 points, which is relatively minimum, but the King of Spades is a great card, and I would probably raise to 44 and wish partner luck. This is the type of auction that game must have some chance of making, and playing in 34 is rarely a fun contract.


















# **Amusing Michaels Auction**

The last round also threw up this misfitting hand.



At many tables the auction began:

$$W$$
  $N$   $E$   $S$   $1 \clubsuit$   $2 \clubsuit^*$ 

Where the 2♣ bid was a Michaels Cue bid showing 5/5+ in the Majors.

Note that a Michaels Cue bid is preferable to a Double, and can also be made on a weaker than opening hand.

First things first, West should not bid Hearts over the Michaels cue bid. Perhaps they should Double to show some points (around 10+ at the two-level), with the next Double by East-West being takeout of the suit that North-South bid to.

North has a terrible hand to be responding to a 2♣ Michaels, and many North's suspected that they were in a lot of trouble if they tried to play in 2♥ or 2♠. Some North's found an excellent alternative to bidding a major, which was to PASS in 2♣. While 2♣ might not be a fun contract, at least you aren't Doubled (yet).

When I saw this hand record, I made a mental bet with myself that of all the North-South scores in the room, someone would be playing in each of the trump suits.

I was right. North-South played in Spades, Hearts, Diamonds, Clubs and No-Trumps.

Those who managed to stop at the twolevel were mostly not Doubled. Those who continued bidding to the three-level were frequently Doubled.

In a misfit, stop low, and try to play in a suit contract.

What I hadn't appreciated right away looking at the hand records, was what East-West might do. They played in Hearts, Diamonds, Clubs and No-Trumps, but never Spades.

Since East-West have significantly more HCP that North-South, they were rarely doubled, but ran into terrible breaks, so went down in most of the contracts they bid.

### **Conventions with Will**

In all the 'other' versions of Stayman, apart from Simple Stayman, the Opener can show something extra about their hand. They can show a minimum or maximum hand. They can show or deny either or both of the majors. They can also possibly show five cards in a Major. You can start with Simple Stayman, and find a fit in either Major. You can also invite game if you want to know if partner is minimum or maximum.

Simple Stayman has other benefits, unique to Simple Stayman. Garbage Stayman is great. Showing a minor suit after Stayman is great. Knowing whether 4NT is Quantitative or Keycard is great.

There is however the issue of discovering if the 1NT Opener has a five-card Major in their 1NT.

First of all. I recommend opening 1NT with a five-card Major. It solves the rebidding problem, and describes the whole hand very well.

In one of my partnerships, I played for a very long time with no way of asking for a Five-Card Major. We put them in the 1NT, with no way to find them out later. I only remember one or two hands in about 5 years where I regretted not finding the Major suit fit.

There is an excellent compromise. You can have Simple Stayman and also have a way of finding a five-card Major.

The Expert solution to this problem is to play 2♣ over 1NT as Simple Stayman.

You can also use 3♣ as Puppet Stayman. For those of you who already know Puppet Stayman, I recommend making

one or two small tweaks.

This version of Puppet Stayman is called Low Info Puppet Stayman, and it gives away as little information to the defenders as possible.

(Opener) (Responder)

1NT 3 Low Info Puppet
Opener bids a five-card Major if they have one.

Opener bids 3♦ otherwise, which doesn't show or deny a four-card Major.

If Responder was only interested in fivecard Majors, then they simply now bid 3NT. Opener may or may not have a four-card Major and didn't tell the Defenders anything.

If Responder is also interested in fourcard Majors, then they bid the suit that they don't have.

(Opener) (Responder)

1NT 3♣ Low Info Puppet

3♦ no 5 3♠ Shows 4 Hearts

Only Responder describes their hand, unless a fit is found. This makes the lead and subsequent defence harder.

I also recommend Simple Stayman over 2NT openings.

















# **Simple Stayman**

# The Full Story!

Here is a Summary of Simple Stayman, and the subsequent follow-ups that I recommend you play.

A lot of these things can't be done using any other version of Stayman.

### If Opener has No 4+ card Major:

(Opener) (Responder)

1NT 2♣ Simple Stayman

2 • \*

Now

Pass: Garbage

2♥/♠: Weak hand (often implies 5+ in the suit bid)

2NT: Invite

3♥/♠: Game Forcing. Implies 5+♥/♠ and 4 of the other Major

3♣/◆: Game Forcing. Usually 5+ cards in that minor, unbalanced

3NT: To play

4NT: Quantitative

### If Opener has 4(+) Hearts.

(Opener) (Responder)

1NT 2♣ Simple Stayman

**2♥**\*

Now

Pass: Garbage

2♠: Invitational with 4 Spades

2NT: Invite (often not 4 Spades)

3♥: Invite with a Heart fit

3♠: Artificial. Agrees Hearts as trumps. 4NT later will be Keycard

3♣/♦: Game Forcing. Usually 5+ cards in that minor, unbalanced

3NT: To play

**4♣/♦**: Splinter

4NT: Quantitative

*The Spades example is basically the same.* 1NT-2 ♣-2 ♠-3 ♥ *is the artificial Suit Setting bid.* 

















# Is there a misprinted Ace of Spades?

In a traditional deck of cards, the Ace of Spades often has a larger picture of a Spade. This goes back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century, when tax was paid on playing cards, and the top card (usually the Ace of Spades) was stamped to show that the duty had been paid.





If your Ace of Spades, or any other card with a clear "up or down" direction on it is in play, then people could possibly use the card to "point" and cheat. Some top players have been caught doing that sort of thing, and banned from bridge.

Note the "split" Spade and Heart symbols. And the peculiar four-leaf Club in the middle of the Five.

A traditional Seven of Diamonds has the middle pip in the top half of the card causing it to be non-symmetrical.

Now you know!

Apart from a few of our excellent directors, no-one needs to actually know all of the details of the laws of bridge.

The first Law is actually the same as beginners lesson 1.

Law 1A)

Aces are high, then Kings, Queens, Jacks, 10, 9, ... 3, 2

The suits are Spades, Hearts, Diamonds, Clubs.

The second part of the law talks about how the cards look.

Law 1B says, that the regulating authority may require Symmetrical cards. Increasingly, you will see modern cards with no "up or down". Get used to seeing these. Not a misprint:

I also found a King of Clubs with a modern almost clean shaven upper lip.



I think this is called a Fu Manchu moustache, but it looks like he is only one small slip of the razor away from being clean shaven.

This is a long way from a 'traditional' King of Clubs.
















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


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
