The New Teams Format for the Open Teams

Day 1 - Qualifying

The teams have been seeded into eight pools of six teams, and will play a Round Robin of 5 matches of 12 boards. At the end of Day 1 all teams move into the Double Knockout Stage, the Top 2 teams in each pool (16 total) go in with No Losses, all other teams go into Day two with One-loss.

Sunday is 5 matches of 12 boards.

Each subsequent day is either 28 board matches (2 x 14) in the Championship and Plate, or longer 56 board matches for the top of the Championship.

If you want a 'change of scenery', you could decide to play the other pair after 14 boards of a 28-board match.

Day 2 - The Knockouts begin

All teams play two 28-board matches (2 sets of 14) against another team. If you win, you continue onwards towards winning the **Championship**.

Once you lose twice (remember that some teams "lost" once on Day 1), you drop from the **Championship** into the **Plate**.

Day 3 (Monday - Reminder 10:30am start!)

Four **No-Loss** teams start today, and they continue to play each other over two 28 board matches. By the end of Day 3, there will be one undefeated team who earns themselves a day off on Tuesday – they qualify straight into the Semi Final! The last team who loses goes into the Quarterfinal.

Teams who start today with **One-Loss** will continue to play other teams with One-Loss and at the end of today, there will be five teams with only **One-loss** and they will all move on to the **Quarter Finals**.

Once a team has their second loss on Day 2 or 3, they drop into the **Plate**. The Plate has a further Knockout or Round Robin starting after lunch on Day 2, and running through Day 3.

The **Shield** begins on Monday after lunch and is a Swiss Teams of 14 board matches that losing teams drop into after other matches finish.

The Shield is a 14-board Swiss Teams event.





The New Teams Format for the Open Teams, continued ...

Day 4 (Tuesday) Quarter Finals for the Championship

The last undefeated team has Tuesday off – the forecast is nice beach weather. There will be 6 teams playing each other in a day-long 56 board match to determine three teams moving into the Semi-Finals, joined by the undefeated team from Day 3. The last knocked out team can choose their opponent, and the others are drawn randomly.

A collection of 16 teams (5 knocked out of the Championship, 7 from the Plate KO rounds and 4 from the Plate Round Robin) form the **Plate Round of 16** and play a 28-board match in the morning. The winners play the **Plate Quarterfinal** in the afternoon (28 boards) and the rest join the **Shield** Swiss teams.

Day 5 (Wednesday) Semi Finals for the Championship

The 4 remaining teams in the Championship play off in a 56 board Semi-Final, with the only undefeated team choosing their opponents – they will also be fresh from their day off of at the beach.

There are 4 teams left in the **Plate** who play a **Semi-Final**, and then a Final and a **Third/Fourth playoff**.

All other teams are trying to win the Shield.

Day 6 (Thursday) Final of the Championship

Two teams play each other to determine the first winner of the new format Double-Knockout Spring National Open Teams.

The rest of the field can watch them on battle it out on vugraph, but are also playing in a variety of new events that start on Thursday (The Gumby-Lazer Mixed Teams, or a Butler Swiss Pairs at one of four masterpoint levels, Open, Intermediate, Restricted, or Novice).



Gumby-Lazer Mixed Teams

Newly named in honour of bridge legends, Pauline Gumby and Warren Lazer, running across four days.

Beloved multi-time Australian representatives Pauline Gumby and Warren Lazer tick one more achievement off their list as the Sydney Spring Nationals hosts the inaugural Gumby-Lazer Mixed Teams event.

Bridge NSW's Spring National Mixed Teams Event will from now on be called the Spring Nationals Gumby Lazer Mixed Teams event, in honour of Pauline Gumby's and Warren Lazer's decades of service to the bridge community.



The pair have lifetime free entry to their event, and were given \$500 each to go towards entry fees in 2025 as part of Bridge NSW's celebration of their service.

The acknowledgement was made at an ABF event in Canberra last night celebrating Pauline Gumby's achievement of becoming Australia's first Diamond Grand Master with over 15,000 masterpoints.

Warren, an Emerald Grand Master, is second to Pauline on the national all-time masterpoint list with nearly 13,600 MPs.

Decades of service

Both members of the Sydney Bridge Centre club have committed countless of volunteer hours to the NSW Bridge Association and Bridge NSW over the decades.

Pauline did an invaluable job running the old NSW Bridge Association website to perfection for 25 years. As calendar coordinator, she ensured the fair and equitable distribution of congresses and championships for decades. Another achievement was her co-creation with Matthew McManus of results presentation software that is still in use today.





Warren initially joined the NSW Events/Tournament Committee and went on to chair it for many years. It was a momentous effort, with NSW events like Monday nights running like clockwork under Warren's watch. Warren also had a leadership role on the NSWBA Council.

Without their efforts and passion, bridge in NSW and Australia would not be what it is today.

Both Pauline and Warren oversaw the Bridge NSW transition from NSWBA. While they are no longer directly involved with Bridge NSW, they remain a treasured part of the Bridge NSW family.

Pauline started playing bridge in 1968 and qualified for her first Australian National Championships (ANC) in the Women's team in 1973.



Warren, a former NSW junior chess champion, started playing while studying at the University of Sydney and partnered with Peter Gill through the late eighties, representing the NSW team for the first time in 1987.

Their first tournament together was the ANC Butler Pairs in Brisbane in 1992. The partnership remained firm from 1995 onwards.

Pauline, who goes under the nickname of "Gumdrops", represented Australia twice in the Venice Cup and the Olympiad, and the formidable partnership donned on the green and gold for the

Bermuda Bowl and the Mixed World Championships. Last year, they won the national senior's championship (ANC) in Orange.

Both received lifetime membership of NSWBA (the former Bridge NSW): Warren in 1997 and Pauline in 2014. With the creation of Bridge NSW, lifetime memberships are now recognised in an Honour Roll.

Useful Conventions With Will

This article is aimed at less experienced tournament players, or club players who don't yet use this competitive bidding idea. The articles that will appear in the later Bulletins are for players of all levels.

Almost every player in the Open Events will already use a Jump raise of partner's suit in a competitive auction as some sort of **Weak Jump Raise** and not an invitational bid.

Here is an example auction:

Here, East's 3♥ bid shows 4 trumps and is not inviting game. Some people play that is shows 5 – 9 points, some use a slightly different range, but everyone uses this bid to show 4+ trumps, and if you are Vulnerable, some shape.

The purpose of a **Weak Jump Raise** is to get in the way.

If South has a Spade fit, then will need to bid 3 pust to compete. If they want to bid a new suit, the auction is already at the four-level. North-South have found their nine+card fit, and are likely to win the

auction right away, and they have made it very hard if the opponent's do want to compete.

The obvious question then is how would East bid if they actually did want to invite game. The answer is to use **Cue Raises.**

If the Responder, or the Responder to an Overcaller cue bids the opponent's suit, it shows a fit and at least invitational points.

Here is an example Cue Raise auction:

East's 2♠ bid is a cue bid of North's 1♠ overcall, and shows 3+ Hearts and 11+ points. It could be more than just an invite.

In response to the Cue Raise, West typically bids 3 to reject the invitation, or 4 and try to make it. Rarely, they will go looking for a slam, but sometimes they do have an incredible hand.

Note that even though $2 \clubsuit$ is an artificial convention, you don't alert any Cue bid.
