Congratulations to the Milne team. Dave Wiltshire, James Coutts, Jess Brake, Shane Harrison, Liam Milne and Susan Humphries.


Dave Wiltshire has won this event three years in a row with five different partners and ten different teammates.

James chose a 3♥ overcall, which Liam raised over the 5♦ bid. With six Hearts, a singleton Diamond, and a little bit of hope, James raised to 6♥ which easily makes on reasonable breaks in Hearts and Spades.

Andy Hung made a great competitive 4% bid.






Dave and Shane sat out during the third set.

around to her hand. She lost a Club and Spade, and suffered a Diamond ruff, but pitched her Hearts and made 10 tricks.



Ben passed (!) and they had a constructive auction to the same 4 contract. On this auction, Liam chose to lead a Heart instead, which established a Heart trick right away for the defence. Ben setup his Clubs, losing the Ace along the way, and discarded a Heart on the Clubs. He lost the Ace of trumps, but when he played a Diamond, he had to lose one. Although the King is onside, the Nine and Ten are annoyingly the setting trick.

This was the first board of the fourth quarter and had a huge penalty and reasonable swing to get things rolling.



6♥ by South, with West overcalling 1♠, and no further competition.

North showed a Club void along the way, and with the Ace of Clubs able to be trumped when Clubs were played, they managed to make 13 tricks and +1430 to the Hung team.

Andy and Sartaj bid to

At the other table, South opened 1♥, West overcalled 1♠ and North bid a 4♣ splinter. Jamie, East, Doubled to show some Clubs. Later, West competed in Clubs, but North-South still managed to bid to 6♥. Jamie took a view that 6♥ would likely make, and tried 7♣ which was Doubled.

Liam led the King of Diamonds at trick one, which looks like a poor start to the defence, but when he later won the Queen of Diamonds, James played the Seven and then Six of Diamonds as a suit preference for Spades, so Liam was able to play a Spade to James, win a Heart back, and play the King of Spades allowing James to discard his Diamond, so the maximum penalty was achieved and -1700 for the Hung team, and a loss of 7 IMPs



Jamie Thompson tried a seven-level sacrifice, but was one trick too much.





This hand had quite a swing in it, and contains a few instructional points.

Jamie didn't respond with minimum hand, James passed the double of 1 and left it for penalties, and Ben didn't run from 1♥ Doubled. The play started with Liam leading the Nine of Hearts, which helped James know that his suit was great. Declarer played a Spade, and Liam won, while James gave even count with the Two.

Liam knew that Declarer had the Ace and King of Hearts. and one more high card. Not knowing whether it was the King of Clubs or



Ace of Diamonds, Liam found a play likely to cater for both. He led a low Diamond. Declarer was likely to play him for Ace anyway, and this wouldn't establish too many tricks in Diamonds before James would be able to trump a Diamond.

Mixed Teams Qualifying

Here are the scores after the 8 rounds of 14 boards.

The top 4 Qualify for the Semi-Final Tomorrow, and the winners of that play off in a 56-board final on Sunday.

The Top Qualifying Team – **Morgan** (Lauren Morgan, Liam Milne, Sophie Ashton, James Coutts) – contains some players from the Open Teams Final, and they dropped into the Mixed Teams after 4 rounds, and managed to win three matches and top the field.

They chose **Mundell** (Andrew Peake, Joan Butts, Giselle Mundell, Peter Buchen) as their Semi-Final opponent.

Useful Conventions With Will – Giorgio Part 3 of 4

In Part 2 of our Giorgio series, we discussed using Giorgio on strong balanced hands.

You can also use Giorgio with very strong unbalanced hands. before we get to that, here are two example auctions that don't have a Giorgio bid in them, but need some discussion.

Here is a question that many partnerships won't have discussed, is a change of suit by responder to an overcall forcing, or not?

Is South's 1♠ change of suit forcing? What if they had bid 2♠, not a jump, but a two-level change of suit, forcing or not?

Some people play that a change of suit is nearly forcing, which works fine until the Advancer picks up an outrageously strong hand and is too nervous to bid 2 and play there.

I recommend that a new suit at the one- and three-level is forcing by the responder to an overcall, but that a new suit at the two-level is not forcing (whether it was a two-over-one or a two-over-two response).

You might have guessed it, but our good friend **Giorgio** can help us out once again.

You can use the **2**** **Giorgio Enquiry** with a *very very* strong unbalanced hand. If they have around 17 or 18+ points they can start with 2*.

The overcaller will nearly always have a terrible overcall and bid 2♥ (repeating their suit shows 7 – 10 points). If the Responder now bids a new suit, I recommend that it is 100% forcing, and denies a fit for the overcall.

Responder should be conservative with a misfitting hand, but sometimes, rarely, they will want to go looking for a game in their own suit.

You and your partner should have an agreement about whether a change of suit is forcing after your team has made an overcall.

It is a remarkably common, yet undiscussed situation.

Using the Giorgio 2 & Enquiry you can play changes of suit as constructive, but non-forcing and use the 2 & and bid on with a Game Forcing hand of your own.

The Winners of both categories played against each other in the final round. Tim and Shane won the final match by 10 IMPs and 13 VPS to 7.




Sue and Mark Lyons were second in the Novice Pairs.





Bad Breaks Not Enough To Stop Maurits

This hand cropped up in round 6 of the Mixed Teams Qualifying, and the Butler Pairs.



Maurits Van Der Vlugt was one of only three declarers in all of the events to bid and make 6♥

North opens 1♣ and South responds 1♥ and becomes the Declarer in 6♥.

If West finds a trump lead from their five-card trump suit, they can cut down the ability to ruff everything, but Maurits received the Jack of Clubs lead.

Maurits won the Ace of Clubs in Dummy, and immediately played the King back.

West trumped this, but they had a natural trump trick anyway, and this allowed Maurits to regain trump control.

West now played a Heart back, but Declarer was able to win the lead in Dummy and ruff two Clubs with his King and Queen of trumps.

He needed to finesse the Diamonds towards Dummy to use as entries to ruff Clubs, but with the Queen onside, he was able to win four Heart tricks in Dummy, four Diamonds eventually, the Ace of Spades, the Ace of Clubs and two high Club ruffs in his hand for 12 tricks.

Very well played, with just a little bit of good luck to counterbalance the terrible luck of the 5-0 trump break.

The datum in the Mixed Teams was just 100 points with three Declarers making slam, one making a game, and 12 failing in a variety of contracts.

NEW LOOK FOR THE AUTUMN NATIONAL CHAMPION-SHIPS 2026: COME TO ADELAIDE

The 2026 Autumn National Championship will now include a two or three-day Matchpoint Pairs event, will qualifying, semi-final and final.

The Teams events will be held first, on Wednesday and Thursday 29th and 30th April, with the Open Teams final being held on Friday 1st May. The Open Teams finalist will each receive prize money; subject to sufficient entries, the first-placed team will win \$3,000 and second will earn \$1,500.

The other categories for the Teams events are:

Under Grand Master Teams (all non-Grand Masters, up to a maximum of 1,100 MPs per player), Under Life Master Teams (all non-Life Masters, up to a maximum of 400 MPs per player). The masterpoint limits apply at the 31st December 2025. Those two events have \$1,000 first-place prize money on offer.

Whilst the final of the Open Teams is being held, we will be offering two new events: the Australian Blue Ribbon Pairs – a matchpoint pairs event, with masterpoints being awarded for all scores of 46+% per session, with separate categories (only the Open starts on Friday 1st May),

a one-day Butler Swiss Pairs event for restricted players – Under Grand Master, Under Life Master (with the same limits as above), Novice (under 100 MPs per player) and Rookie (under 35 MPs per player).

The Australian Blue Ribbon (ABR) Pairs will have three categories:

Open – which is a three-day matchpoint pairs event – qualifying, semi-finals, final

Under Grand Master – a two-day event – qualifying and final

Under Life Master – a two-day event – qualifying and final

In the Open event, the Teams finalists will have automatic entry to the ABR Pairs, including carryforward. The semi-finals will be divided into two fields, A and B. Two pairs from the B semi-final will qualify for the final.

In all events, those who do not qualify for the final will have a Consolation field offered, with the format and prizes to be determined by the number of entries.

Subject to sufficient entries, there will be very attractive prize money available. The Open place-getters will earn themselves \$5,000 for first, \$2,000 for second, \$1,000 for third, with additional awards for the best Women's, Senior and SA pairs (not place-getters). The restricted events offer \$1,000 and \$500 for first and second place.

Come along and support this innovative event! You may find yourself in the money.


