



1H showed 5+, 2D game forcing, 2S showing a 54, 3C fourth suit waiting, 3NT to play and feeling a bit excited (we were joking around at the table). I punted a gloriously terrible 6NT (not even a quantitative invite!) Notice how we can only make 11... yeah bad bid. Nevertheless, as dummy came down Remco knuckled down for a fight instead of punching me in the face. The lead was the jack of spades which went small, ace and small. This gave Remco 11 top tricks and the contract is now ice cold – our opponents had given Remco the gift he needed.

Cashing diamonds, Remco watched North's discards like a hawk, but it was all over on the first club pitch as he now has 12 top tricks. North's QT in hearts is their downfall. If hearts are pitched, South's King gets hooked. If clubs are pitched the Jack will drop. And if spades are pitched, Remco can set up his last small spade. Incredible play was required and incredible play was delivered.

*Editor's note:* this type of play (squeezing an opponent with a finesse threat) is called a Guard Squeeze. And it's incredibly rare. This would be the end position:

When West cashes the last diamond, North is Guard Squeezed. A spade or a club discard establishes a 12th trick for declarer. Whereas discarding the HQ allows declarer to cross to hand with the CA to run the HJ.

Anthony played in 3NT from the East seat after a routine auction. When he cashed two spades and found the break, he realised he could make 12 tricks and no more. So he ducked a heart! He won the return and cashed all the winners outside of diamonds. On last 4 tricks he played the D3 to the DA, the DT to the DK and the DQ unblocking the D9. This enabled him to win trick 13 with the D7, as dummy followed with the D4.

## ABF Youth Awards

The ABF Youth Awards celebrate excellence, commitment, sportsmanship and contribution in Australian youth bridge. There are four major awards presented each year at the Australian Youth Bridge Championships:

- Andrew Reiner Trophy
- Helman-Klinger Achievement Award
- Helman-Klinger Masterpoint Award
- Hills-Hurley Trophy

**Andrew Reiner Trophy:** George Bartley and Bertie Morgan

The Andrew Reiner Trophy is awarded to the best performed pair in the primary target international event, taking account of performance in the event itself, commitment and preparation and contribution to team success.

George Bartley and Bertie Morgan are deserving recipients of this award in 2025. Both are experienced Australian representatives, having played on Under 21 teams before moving up to the Under 26 category in 2024. George and Bertie had little time to prepare as a partnership, with the composition of the team changing just a few months before the World Championships in Italy. Despite this, they recorded the Under 26 team's most consistent results, especially against strong opposition. Both players also made an important contribution to the team's positive atmosphere throughout the event.



**Helman-Klinger Achievement Award:** Heath Watkins

This award is presented each year to the Australian Youth Bridge Player whose ability, achievements, sportsmanship, attitude, contribution and commitment during the calendar year are most deserving.

Heath has shown exceptional development and contribution throughout the year. He advanced quickly to become one of Australia's leading youth competitors. Heath won the 2025 youth team trials and represented Australia for the first time at the World Youth Championships in Italy. With his partner Matt Sieredzinski, he finished 8<sup>th</sup> in the Victorian Festival of Bridge Open Pairs. He and Kate Macdonald reached the quarter-finals of the SNOT Open Teams Plate. And he consistently achieved strong results at Victorian congresses.

You would have seen Heath at almost every national event on the calendar in 2025. He practices hard, analyses boards, and works to improve his game. Additionally, Heath has put in the effort to play with a number of partners and



is eager to play with and learn from more experienced players.

Heath is known for his positive table manner, ethical play and being enjoyable to partner or oppose. He regularly attends Victorian youth nights and supports and encourages less experienced youth players.

### **Helmen-Klinger Masterpoint Award: Heath Watkins**

This award is given to the Australian Youth Player who earns the most masterpoints in the calendar year (excluding players who have already won this award).

Heath Watkins won the Helman-Klinger Masterpoint Award with 196.53 MPs in 2025. While Kate Macdonald earned 199.25 MPS, she was ineligible as she has won the award in a previous year. Special mentions to Kate Macdonald for winning the Life Master McCutcheon, Alex Goss for taking out the Bronze National Master McCutcheon, Lauren Morgan for placing 2<sup>nd</sup> in the National Master category, Anne Davey for placing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Bronze State Master category, and Duncan Lai for placing 2<sup>nd</sup> in the State Master behind Heath in 1<sup>st</sup> place.

### **Hills-Hurley Trophy: Kate Macdonald and Zac Ross**

This trophy, donated by Richard Hills and Steve Hurley, is to encourage talented young bridge players in forming long-standing partnerships and reward successful pairs which have developed a well-organised partnership to harness their full potential.

In 2021 Zac and Kate were both very new to bridge, and they looked across the table at the empty bridge club that was Qld youth nights, and realised their destiny must lay ahead together. They quickly took to club play and formed a partnership for the ANC that year.

It was then that the competitive bridge bug really bit them and they went from strength to strength, playing in congresses, winning the Gold Coast novice pairs in 2023, and playing ANCs and youth weeks. They brought

an enthusiastic and supportive attitude to their play together, along with their questionable assortment of matching Hawaiian shirts and KFC bucket headwear.

At the 2025 youth week selection trials they jumped like Mario over each collapsing ledge and were eventually rewarded with their first taste of international play as a pair. Their partnership has shown how invaluable it is to stay positive, patient and persistent whether results are good or bad.

They have each put significant work into forming new youth partnerships recently, and both partnerships have prospered early on, in no small part due to the same traits that Kate and Zac learnt and developed together.




## Opening Lead Quiz

Today's hand comes from Match 9 of the Butler stage of the Australian Junior selection event:

Should we lead 4<sup>th</sup> from our longest suit or does a high heart look appealing? Let's see what a simulation of 5000 hands says:

Lead card	% defeat	Ave tricks	Score

This was the most clearcut simulation of the week. A top heart lead is the best lead by a huge margin. Why? Firstly, with declarer denying a Major suit, we should be inclined to lead one. Dummy won't have a 5 hearts and declarer won't have 4, so partner must have a minimum of 3 cards. There is no similar guarantee with the minor suits – in the extreme case, it's entirely possible partner has a void in clubs!

Hearts is also a more likely source of tricks. If we only find partner with the HQTxxx, we will beat the contract with a heart lead. A club lead, on the other hand, requires a lot more from partner to take the contract down.

Finally, the top heart lead is quite safe. Even if declarer has the HQ, partner will discourage and it will often not cost a trick. A club lead needs to find partner with multiple honours just to avoid giving away a trick.

After 3 days of the Australian Junior Butler, the top pair will automatically qualify for the Australian Junior Team. The next 4 pairs will contest Stage 2A on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup>. At the end of Saturday, the top pair will join the Australian Junior Team and the bottom pair will be eliminated. On Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> the final two remaining pairs will fight it out in Stage 2B for the final spot on the Australian Junior Team.
